



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## April Veteran of the Month

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The Office of Veterans Affairs and Military Programs at UConn is pleased to honor Brian Burke as UConn's April Veteran of the Month. Brian Burke served in the Marines from 2002 to 2008 and he completed two tours in Iraq; the second one was with Charlie Co. 1/25 out of Plainville, CT. Brian is currently a part-time student in UConn's MBA program (PMBA). He previously attended UConn as a full-time student in the Civil Engineering Master's Program in 2008. Brian shares the Master's Program in Civil Engineering was a great opportunity for him, since other schools he applied to, preferred candidates with a traditional engineering degree (his undergraduate degree is in Physics), but UConn saw his non-traditional path as a benefit. Soon after he was accepted, Brian began working on a research project for the Department of Homeland Security. This experience prepared him for the technical

challenges of being an engineer. Brian was able to begin working for a design firm as a bridge engineer before he graduated. In the Fall of 2012, Brian enrolled in the PMBA program at the Hartford Campus. This Spring, Brian graduates from the PMBA program at UConn, with concentrations in management and project management. He shares he enjoyed his time in the program because he had the opportunity to interact with students from a wide variety of industries. This diversity has led to engaging and informative classroom discussions, and they have influenced his problem-solving at work. Now, Brian can look at problems from different points-of-view that he wouldn't have considered previously.

## Scholarships with upcoming deadlines

**Hammer Family Scholarship and the Marines Memorial Tribute Scholarship** – <http://mmanetcom.marineclub.com/scholarships/vets>

Deadline = **April 23** (may vary from year to year)

Eight (8) Hammer Family Scholarships are available in the amount of \$5,000 each. All eligible U.S. Veterans who wish to study in the fields of Math, Statistics, Chemistry, Physics, or Engineering (Aerospace, Civil, Computer, Electrical, Industrial, Manufacturing, Materials, or Mechanical) are welcome to apply. James and Linda Hammer are Benefactor Members of the Marines' Memorial Association and are eager to assist student Veterans committed to advancing their education.

Four (4) Memorial Tribute Scholarships are available in the amount of \$2,500 each. The Memorial Tribute Scholarship is available for military personnel leaving full time service and entering an undergraduate college program. All US military personnel who have transitioned from Active

Duty to reserve or civilian status within the past 3 years may apply.

**United States Armed Forces Veteran Scholarship** – <http://abroad.uconn.edu/resources/veterans-affairs-benefits-and-uconn-education-abroad-programs/>

This UConn Education Abroad scholarship is available to UConn students committed to study abroad programs who have served or continue to serve in our Armed Forces and are registered with UConn Veteran's Affairs and Military Programs. Veterans will be automatically awarded \$2,500 in scholarship support if they commit to a semester-long study abroad program and \$1,000 if committed to a summer program. There is no application for this scholarship; students just need to indicate their veteran status on their study abroad application. This scholarship can be applied to the costs of any type of UConn-approved study abroad program and can cover Program Fees, Study Abroad Fees, tuition, and other study abroad-related costs as long as they are billed through UConn.

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## **Combat Exposure and Academic Integration: Self-Reported Well-Being Among Student Veterans Study**

Jeffrey Goulding, is a graduate student in the Counseling Psychology PhD program in the Department of Professional Psychology and Family Therapy at Seton Hall University.

This a survey for a national research project aimed to help student veterans by better understanding the relationship for veterans between the stressors of deployment and feelings of well-being upon returning from deployment. It also seeks to understand how student veterans feel they are transitioning to life on college campuses. This research will work to inform policy makers, the military, mental health professionals and institutions of higher learning how to better help veterans transition post deployment.

Your participation in this study involves completing a demographic questionnaire and two measures. Total participation time for each individual is approximately 10-20 minutes.

Participation in this study will provide valuable information in further understanding the factors that contribute the different stressors that veterans experience as a result of their deployment and the difficulties they may have transitioning to campus life as well as potential avenues for easing transition and informing therapists and college campuses about how better to serve military service men and women.
